OPENING DEVOTIONAL FOR CHURCH COUNCIL JANUARY 2004 MEETING (LED BY BRIAN KAY)
PSALM 105: "OH, GIVE THANKS TO THE LORD!"

HOW SHOULD WE END 2003? Let us heed the wonderful advice of the psalmist who wrote Psalm 105: *"Oh, give thanks to the Lord! Call upon His name; Make known His deeds among the peoples! Sing to Him; sing psalms to Him; Talk of all His wondrous works! Glory in His holy name. Let the hearts of those rejoice who seek the Lord."* [Psalm 105:1-3] The psalmist offers at least six different suggestions as to how we may conclude this past year.

1. **"Give Thanks to the Lord"** But of course, we must give thanks to the Lord for all His blessings poured out on us in 2003! Without the Lord's blessings, we would not have survived the year, let alone consider the growth that we have seen here at Zion! It would be wrong of us NOT to give thanks to the Lord!
2. **"Make known His deeds among the peoples!"** What a challenge this word is! Let us determine to speak of what the Lord has done in our midst! Let us speak of how He has so graciously blessed, month after month- throughout the whole year!
3. **"Sing to Him..."** One great expression of our appreciation of the Lord is to "sing to Him." How our hearts must naturally desire to worship and praise the Lord for who He is and what He has done for us!
4. **"Talk of all His wondrous works"** Many are the wondrous works of the Lord. Let us take time to have a quick review of the many wondrous works of the Lord. Let us just highlight three things!
 - a) He continues to work his miracles at Zion on a daily basis.
 - b) People have come to salvation in Christ at Zion in 2003!
 - c) He has provided for all our needs! From a financial and spiritual stand point.

5. "Glory in His holy name" Let us be challenged to end the year and begin another glorying in His holy name indeed! There is so much to rejoice in.

6. "Let the hearts of those rejoice who seek the Lord" Are we seekers of the Lord? Then our hearts would surely rejoice in all that God has been doing in our midst! Let us end 2003 on a high note of rejoicing!

LET US LOOK FORWARD TO A GREAT NEW YEAR! The beginning of a new year is a time for reflection and evaluation---a time to think about what has gone before, and to look ahead to what is to come. It is a time for renewal, for a new start, for beginning again. For many people it is a sad and lonely time. Perhaps past months brought heartache, trial and pain. Perhaps there has been sorrow and bereavement, and separation from loved ones. These troubles make it difficult to start our afresh. Perhaps the months ahead are full of foreboding, filled with the prospect of difficult mountains to climb and deep rivers to cross. We can sometimes face the beginning of a year with fear rather than with hope.

HOW SHOULD WE PREPARE FOR 2004? Let us once again consider the advice of the psalmist in the following text. "*Seek the Lord and His strength; Seek His face evermore.*" [Psalm 105:4]

1. Let us determine to seek the Lord more diligently in the New Year
2. Let us endeavor to discover more of His strength
3. Let us make a great commitment to "seek His face evermore."

To walk into a new year is to walk into the unknown. It is to traverse new paths, and to walk along new roads. But he who holds the future knows what the future holds. And the Jesus Christ who is untarnished and unchanged with the passing of the months has promised to walk alongside his people wherever they may be. Let us look forward to 2004 with an even greater faith in the Lord. May the New Year prove even more glorious! May the Christ, the only Lord and Savior, be our guide in 2004.

"He sternly ordered and commanded them not to tell anyone, saying, "The Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised." Then he said to them all, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will save it." Luke 9:21-24

Uh-Oh! It's almost Lent again! It's that pesky little season that seems to sneak up on us so quickly! There we are joyously celebrating Christmas and the New Year, festivities abounding,

and then, wham, we're hit by Lent. We go from singing some of the most joyous hymns of the church year to singing hymns with the cadence and words of a funeral dirge. And then there's the message. The message no longer reflects "good news of great joy", it reflects tough lessons, foreboding, and, ultimately, death. It's no wonder that Lent is not most Christians favorite church year season.

I often overhear people talking about Lent. Usually it's in the form of the question "What are you giving up for Lent?". Yes it's quite true that Christ gave up his life to save ours, and thanks be to God for that! However, every Lent, I'm reminded of one of our former Pastor's sermons. It came during the time that I was in high school and often felt ashamed that I didn't give up anything for Lent. Pastor Lutz's sermon that Sunday stated that, yes, Christ did give up his life, but he also "took up his cross" for us. With that Pastor Lutz explained that we should not **give up** anything for Lent, instead we should **take up** something! Now he did not mean taking up tennis or golf, eating chocolate or going out to dinner more frequently, but he did mean taking up something worthwhile. Something along the lines of helping our neighbors, volunteering at a food bank, visiting shut ins, helping in the community, etc... We were not just to take this up for Lent, however, we were to take this up permanently. It made sense! Giving up something for 40 days seemed to pale in comparison to Christ's ultimate sacrifice. Taking up something good and worthwhile for, perhaps, a lifetime seemed to be a little more appropriate.

Thankfully we are saved by grace through faith and not by doing good works, or most of us, myself included, wouldn't have a chance at salvation. However, Christ still commands us to help our neighbors. So as Lent approaches, what are we going to take up? Helping others is a great way to add some happiness to a more than somber church season.

NEWS FROM MELANIE, ZION'S MISSIONARY

Hello everyone! It's been a while since I wrote my last update. In the past two months or so lots has happened. I've become accustomed to my surroundings and the wonderful people I work with, and yet still every day I'm still learning and experiencing new things.

The last weekend in November we had family day here. Masses of people were packed into our small gathering room. In the morning we had a service, then a guest speaker, then a few presentations of additions to be made to the building and programs in 2004, and to close the "ceremony" my dancing group performed. This group is made up of 20 residents, 10 male-female pairs, and the rehearsals are absolutely hilarious and so much fun. There is also a home funded by the same organization in the main town of Guestrow here where most of these people come from, and their housing is for those who are capable of living and doing things more on their own and go to work regularly in the workshops. After the opening in the morning, the families of the residents then got to visit their living quarters and to buy a variety of things they have made in the craft room, ranging from candles to Advent calendars, and also got to make ornaments and other decorative things for Christmas with them in the craft room.

My second seminar, December 8-12, suddenly came upon me, during which we all once again played lots of "get to know each other" games, told all about our work and the joys and frustrations of it, and also had a few speakers where we did a lot of small group activities. Our main theme was Christmas, so we did a lot of crafts, talked about our childhood memories of Christmas and what it really means to us, and even acted out the play in small groups, in full costume. I was Joseph, and it was quite amusing. I felt more at ease this time, and overall it was much better for me.

A week before Christmas the church choir that I am in had a beautiful Christmas concert with the Neubrandenburg Philharmonic Orchestra in the main church in Guestrow. It was completely sold out, with about 620 in attendance. I'm not used to church choirs having such elaborate concerts, but it was wonderful, and the repertoire was challenging and well received by the audience. The Friday before Christmas was also the Christmas festival here where I work, where the play was done outside and afterwards all the residents celebrated in their "families." It's a very important festival for a lot of them, since many don't go home or get a visit for Christmas, so they can celebrate it with the people they live with and the staff members that work with them that they know well. I also had a visit from a good friend a week before Christmas, which I enjoyed. On Christmas Eve I began the celebration at 3pm by singing with the choir in the first of three services that evening, two with the adult choir and one with the youth choir. Both of the churches were wonderfully decorated, with large Christmas trees and candles, and filled with the warmth of people's joyous singing and the wonderful music. Then afterward I had dinner with my supervisor, her family and her parents, sang Christmas carols, and

exchanged gifts. And on Christmas Day I went with her family to visit her sister's family and tons of other relatives there for a Christmas day dinner. We told a lot of stories, sang lots of carols, and had a lot of fun. I felt the amazing warmth and kindness coming from these people and thanked God, that I could experience such a wonderful Christmas so far away from home.

My work in general is still going very well. My main responsibility is to work with the groups in the craft room, but every Monday I also go swimming with 1 or 2 of the residents, every Tuesday accompany one of them into town so they can go shopping, every Friday I help put together a service for about 20 of the residents, and usually every other weekend I work with a group of twelve men. There I mainly help to prepare meals and take them on walks, play games with them, etc. They're a really fun group to work with, although at times difficult and challenging. It's always a new experience each time I work with them. The situation for most all the residents is that their relatives come to see them and sometimes take them home only on holidays, and those who are over 60 mostly don't have any relatives left. I think about that and it makes me realize how important it is to them that I am there, and that the smallest thing that I do or say can mean so much to them, and for that I am very happy that I am here.

My time here already has gone by so fast. I enjoy the newness that comes with each day, the happiness that I bring to these people when I work with them, and the new perspective and joy that they give me when I am with them. For this New Year I am challenging myself to constantly be more patient, to be more loving, to seek a better understanding of my work here, and to constantly seek God's will for my life.
