

GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR:

The word for *Lent* comes from old English, and refers to the lengthening of daylight during the season, which culminates with the celebration of light and life that enters our world through the Good News of the Resurrection on Easter. It is certainly true that since the winter solstice on December 21, the daylight during each day has been a little bit longer than the day before. Still, the cloud cover, increasing precipitation, gray skies, and our snowy outlook usually make it hard to believe that the sun's power is growing during the months of January and February. This has certainly been even more powerfully true this year, with February becoming a record month for snow and cold. Who would have thought that when Punxsutawney Phil saw his shadow on Groundhog Day, the six more weeks of winter would have been this severe! Of course, the upside to combining record snow with lots of cold is that the snow cover stays white longer; but that is little consolation for the wintry doldrums February has delivered in giving way to March.

When Marilyn and I were in Palm Springs in January, we took in another Norwegian film at the Palm Springs International Film Festival. Last year it was the interesting film *O Horton*, a delightful story, with scenes of Norway's winter forming the backdrop of the train run from Bergen to Oslo. On the one hand, it was nice to know that the weather is far worse in Norway than it is here in Northeast Ohio. On the other hand, it was hard seeing how brutal the weather can be, and what a depressing effect it can have on the people who endure it. This year's Norwegian gem was entitled *North*, and again, weather played a big role in both telling and understanding the story. The main character is found recovering from depression. It turns out that depression goes hand-in-hand with the cold, wind, and snow, together with the dreary darkness and awful loneliness that flow from the landscape of life in the Arctic Circle.

Marilyn has been to Norway (in the summer), and reports that the fjords are beautiful, the villages quaint, the people friendly, and the fresh fish is to-die-for. We have no reason not to believe her report. But there is no disputing that the winters in Norway are severe, and the effects of what we now call *Seasonal Affective Disorder* are well documented throughout the northern hemisphere. There are many reasons why our world longs for the lengthening of daylight and the increasing sun power that grows as Lent leads to Easter. Light and life go together. This connection forms the backdrop of our worship plans. March will give way to the Good News of the Son's triumph. With each week, we will mark the imminent end of this sad season, as it gives way to the arrival of the true joy that comes with our Lord's Resurrection.

Each of the four Sundays in March moves us closer to the arrival of Easter in April. On the evening of March 7, we offer an excellent Lenten drama featuring Jim Fidler as *Barabbas*. On the evening of March 14, we offer a selection of Special Music for Lent featuring our Senior Choir and Zion's Praise Team. On the evening of March 21, our children will join in their dramatic reading of the Passion Narrative from Luke. Then, on the morning of March 28, the Sunday School presents their Annual Easter Program, which sets the events of Holy Week in motion, with Palm Sunday leading to Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. The darkness of Good Friday will give way to the dawn of Easter morn, when the light, which has come into the world through the birth of Jesus, illumines the way that leads to true life, the life God intended, the life God desires, the life God promises and gives through Jesus Christ. Come and worship.

CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS

Jayne was present for the meeting, but not for that part of the meeting when we approved Mutual Ministry’s recommendation. All agreed that Jayne was a great choice! Jayne returned to a room that was happy for her interest and glad to welcome her aboard. Mark Votaw and Dale Jacobs were unable to attend.

MORE COUNCIL NEWS

Dave Palumbo: The Treasurer’s Report for January was surprisingly strong. We usually expect to be overwhelmed by utility bills; but our new HV/AC system has truly taken the sting out of these winter gas bills. Snow-plowing and salting will surely take a toll on our finances; but so far offerings have for the most part kept pace with expenses. The month of February seems to be on track to leave us with a very manageable deficit as we enter March. We understand that staffing expenses will now increase with the hiring of our Church Office Secretary; but we are in a strong position to take on this challenge.

Susan Heyard: Mutual Ministry offered the recommendation that Jayne Schrader become our new Church Office Secretary. Brian Milek joined Sue, Jim Fidler, and Pastor Sherwindt in conducting the search, interviewing candidates, formalizing the job description, and arriving at our first choice. More than one-hundred-and-seventy-five persons applied for the position. Six candidates were selected as finalists; five were interviewed. The presence of so many applicants created a very strong pool of persons with skills and experience precisely in the areas of expertise that were required for our position. Jayne’s sixteen years of experience serving as the Office Manager at Habitat for Humanity of Greater Stark & Carroll Counties, together with her forty-two years of very active membership at Zion combined to give her the edge as the strongest of five very strong candidates. Also, Mutual Ministry added a fourth member to our group. Lorraine Weinman was approved to replace Linda Ross on Mutual Ministry. She joins Brian Milek, Blair Woodside, and Kay Davis as our four non-Council members of this ministry.

COUNCIL NEWS (CONT'D)

Tina Beaber, Learning Ministry Elder, was happy to report that our participation in this year's *Souper Bowl of Caring* generated almost \$250 in congregational support. Our Youth at Zion were one of 9,741 groups that combined to raise \$8,884,752 in an effort to help folks in need across the country. Every single dollar that is donated goes to help the charity of each group's choice. Our charity is *Shoes & Clothes for Kids*. We'll pool our resources, add something from our Youth Fund, head out on a shopping safari, purchase what we need, and give it to Mark Votaw to take with him to Cleveland, where *Shoes & Clothes for Kids* provides new shoes and clothes to thousands of kids in the greater Cleveland area at no charge.

Jim Dansizen, Witness Ministry Elder, reported that the Witness Team will resume meeting monthly, beginning in February. Kelly Walters has been asked to add a fresh voice to the team, as she joins Jim, Lorraine Weinman, Elaine Fidler, Jim's son, Howard Dansizen, and Pastor Sherwindt. We look forward to continuing some past successes, including our participation in *The Main Street Festival*, perhaps resuming the fun times we facilitated with the *Sunday Brunch Bunch*, and adding some community service programs to our calendar of events. Stay tuned.

Zion's Sunday Evening Lenten Dinners: Council finalized the schedule of Lenten dinners and services, with Sunday, March 7, serving as the occasion when Council will host the Lenten dinner and Jim Fidler will portray *Barabbas* in our Lenten drama. Due to an afternoon Canton Symphony date, we decided to delay the start of our dinner one-half hour to 6:00 p.m., with our devotional drama beginning at 6:45 p.m. We hope this change will enable everyone to join us.

MEET JAYNE SCHRADER!

Jayne Schrader has been a member of Zion since 1968, when her family moved to North Canton from Parma Heights, Ohio. Her mother, Edna Fischer, has been an active member since their arrival; and her children, Renee and Adam, have been active here since birth! Jayne has been active in many ways, most recently as Church Council Secretary, an office she's held since November of 2005. Jayne was appointed by Council to serve the remainder of an unexpired term, and then was elected to two of her own terms in 2006 and 2008. We expect that she will complete her second term, which ends in June.

At Dick Spall's suggestion, Jayne applied to become the Office Manager at Habitat for Humanity of Greater Canton back in May of 1993. Jayne joined the Executive Director to become a staff of two. They were working on 7 homes and overseeing a total of 20. During the course of Jayne's tenure, they grew in strength and size in every way. Now they average 20 new homes annually, and oversee a portfolio of 350 homes and are in the process of adding new families to the roll of successful homeowners. Habitat for Humanity of Greater Canton and Carroll Counties is Ohio's leading affiliate, having distinguished this site as being only one of seven nationally that, in addition to building 20 new homes in our neighborhood, has contributed over \$1,000,000 to help in building homes all over the world! This is a reflection of the tremendous support our local Habitat has built up over the years. During Jayne's tenure, the number of people in the data base for quarterly newsletter mailings grew from 1,800 to over 11,000!

Needless to say, we are thrilled to be able to use the many skills Jayne has honed in being a part of such a successful team at Habitat.

ELCA DISASTER RESPONSE

The dire poverty in Haiti left the country completely vulnerable when its earthquake struck. The tragic realities of devastation continue to fill the news and crush the lives of Haiti's people. The ELCA has supported a multi-national, multi-lateral response that includes the coordination of relief and development agencies through Action by Churches Together (ACT) Alliance, of which the ELCA has been a member since 1995. Support has been provided through Lutheran World Relief (LWR), Church World Service (CWS), and the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) to respond to the needs of affected individuals and families. The Lutheran World Federation has been present in Haiti for over two decades. To date, the ELCA has given more than 30,406 gifts totaling \$5,248,000! We can count ourselves among ELCA Lutherans responding, with donations designated for Haiti Relief totaling \$500.00. You have our thanks.

While Haiti remains a front-burner hot spot needing Disaster Relief, recent news from Chile makes it clear that there is no rest for the weary. On February 27, an 8.8 magnitude earthquake struck in Chile, 200 miles south of the capital city of Santiago. The ELCA is uniquely positioned to respond. Unlike other aid organizations, ELCA Disaster Response works through long-standing partnerships on the ground that are prepared and able to reach the most affected communities. One such partner, *the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Chile*, reports that church buildings are already being used to shelter the homeless. Our partners are in need of food, water, water filters, shelter and personal hygiene items to distribute to affected communities. If you would like to help, rest assured that 100% of all dollars given will help the victims of these disasters. Zion will gladly forward all designated gifts to ELCA Disaster Response.

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

Several of our members have taken the lead in preparing great discussions for our *People of Faith* Bible study entitled *A Gardener, Two Travelers, and a Cheat*, which deals with the memorable cast in Genesis – Adam & Eve, Abraham & Sarah, and Jacob. This Bible study is a hoot! These stories are really funny. This past week, Abraham did his stand-up impression of Henny Youngman's famous line, "Take my wife, please!" That was the line with which he abandoned Sarah to a crew of not-so-secret admirers closely associated with the Egyptian Pharaoh. It's been pretty tough for men trying to defend Adam's blame games, Abraham's cowardice, and Jacob's cheating ways. It's been so tough that at times we've had to resort to child's play to even the playing field. Someone was surfing online, and actually found this piece entitled *The Children's Bible in a Nutshell*.

"In the beginning, which occurred near the start, there was nothing but God, darkness, and some gas. The Bible says, 'The Lord thy God is one, but I think He must be a lot older than that. Anyway, God said, 'Give me a light!' and someone did. Then God made the world. He split the Adam and made Eve. Adam and Eve were naked, but they weren't embarrassed because mirrors hadn't been invented yet. Adam and Eve disobeyed God by eating one bad apple, so they were driven from the Garden of Eden. 



Senior in the Spotlight




Atlee Royer Fall was born February 22, 1910, and he celebrated his 100th Birthday with a party in Luther Hall on the third Sunday in February. The Mayor of North Canton was on hand to present Atlee with a key to the city. Members Chuck Danner and Jim Dansizen were instrumental in helping North Canton to acknowledge this special day, and the women of Zion, including Jayne and Renee Schrader, helped set the table and serve up lots of delicious cake, mixed nuts, along with punch and coffee. Hundreds of friends and family members were on hand to wish Atlee the best. It was a day to remember, a day to recall the long life of a dear friend who married Mabel Leiter on September 5, 1936, was baptized on October 25, 1936, welcomed daughter Janice into the world on July 5, 1938, and son Larry on February 20, 1940.

Atlee's birthday celebration brought back many memories of how things have changed during the century of his life. Jim Fidler offered this interesting set of observations: Atlee has seen eighteen presidents of the United States, sixteen Prime Ministers of Great Britain, tyrants such as Lenin, Stalin, Hitler, Mao, and terrorists including Osama Bin Laden. He has witnessed and experienced two World Wars, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, Operations Desert Storm and Iraqi Freedom. Since the day of Atlee's birth the world has suffered the repercussions of the assassination of Crown Prince Ferdinand (WWI), the Great Depression, eight recessions, the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor (WWII), the assassination of JFK, and the 9/11 Terrorist Attack.

Atlee has been alive during the infamous birth and ignominious death of Soviet Communism, the defeat of Fascism and Nazism abroad, and the trials, travails and successes of the Civil Rights Movement at home. He's witnessed the birth of India, Israel, and the transformation of colonial Africa into independent countries. Medical, scientific, and technological advances have included a cure for polio, the development of rail, automobile and air transportation, and the invention of radio, television, cellular phones, pagers and computers, and, in case Atlee has any interests in cloning his longevity, we have made incredible progress in the profiling of human DNA.

Moving a little closer to home, the Falls transferred their membership to Zion in 1942, and during that time Atlee has enjoyed the tenure of Pastors Howard Yeager, Paul Daneker, R.E. LaFontaine, Walter Ruth, Charles Hasselbach, Kurt Meuschke, Richard Findlay, James Lutz, Rich Ferris, Louise Mollick, Jesse Dunbar, and Mark Sherwindt. When Atlee joined the church we were worshiping on West Maple Street. In 1954, we purchased our Lindy Lane property, then developed it, with subsequent improvements, expansions, and renovations, including the dedication of Memorial Hall in 1980, the installation of our Shantz Pipe Organ in 1988, and the celebration of our 175th anniversary in 1989. What remarkable changes over the years! Through it all, Atlee's soft-spoken gentleness and dedicated faithfulness have been constants for friends and family to enjoy. We congratulate Atlee on his 100 years, and we pray that God continues to bless his life with an overflowing abundance of His never-ending love.
