

GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR:

October was a wonderful month filled, it seemed, with activities every week, and dominated by planning and celebrating of our 11th Annual Youth Missions Craft Show. We again enjoyed the support of many crafters, lots of shoppers, a great kitchen crew, and members who were all in when it came to helping every aspect of this event exceed expectations. We sold over three hundred German dinners, rented over sixty craft tables, raffled off five beautiful raffle baskets. When all is said and done, we will have raised over \$4,500.00 for the Youth of Zion, our many youth & family activities, and mission trips yet to come.

November begins with All Saints Sunday on November 2nd. This Festival celebrates the gift of eternal life promised by the Lord of life, who burst the bars of death with the dawn of a new age proclaimed with the Resurrection on Easter morn. *“For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that all who believe in him should not perish but have eternal life.”* Luther called this the *gospel in miniature*; and that is the Good News we reverently remember with the ringing of the bell as each name is read identifying loved ones among us who were called to their heavenly home this past year. What could be more moving than remembering that those whom we love have been claimed by God’s love, a love that promises to never, ever let us go.

On November 9th we will take a moment to remember our veterans, who on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month have a day set aside by our nation to honor those who have served in America’s military. The next Sunday on our calendar calls for the celebration of the work of the Women of the Church. This is a day set aside in the ELCA to honor the courage and faithfulness displayed in reclaiming the original vision and ancient practice of letting the Spirit decide whose gifts the church needs to thrive. I am referring to the ordination of women; and the ELCA has been richly blessed through the time, talents, and treasures that gifted women have shared with the life of the church. We will thank God for this on Sunday, November 16th.

The following Sunday brings us to the end of the church year with the Festival of Christ the King Sunday. The Scriptures promise that there will be an end to the disorder of things with the final judgment. We acknowledge this promise with our creeds every Sunday as we confess that Christ will come again to judge the living and the dead, and then claim that we are looking for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Judgment is good news because the gospel promises that it will not be strict justice but God’s grace that sets the bar for opening the doors of the kingdom to all believers. This will be our focus at worship on November 23rd.

The end of this present church year signals the beginning of a new church year. The Church calls this Advent. At Zion, we call it the beginning of our regular schedule of Advent dinners and Advent services. There is, of course, more to Advent than great food, good fellowship, and weekly opportunities to enjoy the gifts that Zion’s talented members bring to our Sunday evening services. We have so much to celebrate with the arrival of a new year; and this begins on November 30th with the First Sunday of Advent. Plan to join us for these special Sundays in November as we celebrate the gifts of God’s love alive among us.

CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS

Mark Votaw called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. Members in attendance included Carol Rossbach (Council Secretary), Dale Jacobs (Worship), Heather Hoffman (Parish Life), Randy Cizek (Social Outreach), Jayne Schrader (Caring), Jim Fidler (Resource), Todd Elsass (Property) and Pastor Sherwindt. Heather Hoffman opened with devotions, and our business was concluded by 7:48 p.m.

The September Treasurer’s Report showed a small surplus of \$87.89 for the month, which adds to our year-to-date surplus of \$1,878.44. We are on course for yet another operating budget in balance. October was a month when much of our fundraising attention was devoted to the Youth Fund and the Craft Show; but we were able to leave ourselves in good shape as we head into a very generous season and two very generous months.

The main item of business on our agenda was getting ready for Zion’s *Fall Congregational Meeting*. We finalized the details of our 2015 Proposed Budget Guidelines, which will be presented for congregational approval when we gather for a delicious dinner (at 6:15 p.m.) and our Congregational Meeting (7:00 p.m.) on Wednesday, October 29th. CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

We began with a truly exceptional dinner, prepared by Dave Palumbo, with help from Dale Jacobs, and the Church Council. We served a mouth-watering rendition of shake-and-bake boneless chicken breasts, with noodles, vegetables, and a wide assortment of delicious desserts. Council members helped with set-up, serving, and clean-up. The food was great, and so was the turnout.

We easily met our quorum, as is usually the case when the congregational meeting is scheduled on the same night as our Annual Halloween Party. President Mark Votaw called our meeting to order at 7:08 p.m. Jon & Barb Elsass led our singing of *We All Are One in Mission*. Pastor Sherwindt reminded us that we are well on our way to yet another operating budget in balance, with our year of bicentennial property projects and celebrations adding to the generosity our members have displayed this year and last. We have raised over \$60,000 for our bicentennial projects and celebrations this year alone. This is in addition to balancing our budget!

Our 2015 Budget Guidelines call for lower targets for income and expenses than the 2014 budget had set out. We are confident that we are on course to balance this year’s budget, just as we have done for the past ten years. Dave Palumbo and Laura Thompson assisted in the presentation of our motion to approve our 2015 Budget; and we voted our approval with an overwhelming majority! When the meeting was adjourned at 7:25 p.m., we gathered in Luther Hall to draw the winners of our raffle baskets. This annual ritual has become another wonderful celebration of congregational generosity, as all facets of fundraising related to this event found great support among our members & friends.

MORE COUNCIL NEWS

Social Outreach Ministry: Tony Niesz anticipated that he would have the time to serve when he threw his name in the ring to serve as our Social Outreach Ministry Elder. His expertise in preparing exceptional desserts for our many fellowship events provided delicious evidence that he had the “social” aspect of this ministry covered. With changes in his schedule, the time needed to serve on Council was no longer available. We approached Randy Cizek about the possibility of serving the remainder of Tony’s term, and Randy agreed. Randy’s expertise on the grill made him the obvious choice! We thank Tony for his willingness to serve, and are happy to welcome Randy aboard.

Property Ministry: Our Thursday morning retirees’ crew continues to make great headway in keeping the property looking great. We authorized more tree-trimming near the parsonage; and we are looking forward to an outdoor clean up day, perhaps on the Saturday of November 15. The key to setting this date is that our trees are done shedding leaves, since we clean up the beds around the church and clean out the gutters, too. Stay tuned and follow the weekly bulletin as more information is shared.

Worship Ministry: While the order of our hosts for the Sunday evening Advent dinners has not yet been determined, we are looking forward to continuing the format of dinner at 5:30 p.m., with the service at 6:15 p.m. This begins on November 30th. Many details are yet to be decided, but we know that Advent wreaths will be the focus of our First Sunday in Advent, the Chancel Guild will host our dinner, and the Pastor’s message will elaborate on the meaning of our Advent Faceted Stained Glass Window. Resource Ministry: Jim Fidler, who has familiarity with the law and with real estate, continues to make progress when it comes to doing some of the preliminary research that would go into a title search for the parsonage. While this is not immediately pressing, we know that we need to make slow and steady progress in helping Zion to think about the next chapter for the parsonage. In terms of financial resources, we continue to be blessed with zero debt, budgets balanced, property projects funded, and healthy balances in our many special funds, especially the funds we hold in our Merrill Lynch account.

Steering Ministry: It is not uncommon that members who are willing to get involved in the organizational life of the church are also willing to get involved at work, with family, and all sorts of personal commitments. Our Vice President, Brian Milek, who as a newer member was willing to step forward when the need for his time and expertise arose with an opening on Mutual Ministry, wound up also serving as Vice President on Council, as the head of Mutual Ministry, and as our point person in pushing for involvement in the Internship Program. Between time commitments at home and travel responsibilities abroad, Brian, with regrets and gratitude, submitted his resignation as Vice President of Council, and Council, with regrets and gratitude, accepted his resignation.

Caring Ministry: The Great Turkey Give-away is right around the corner. We need 90 turkeys for the families we serve through the ministry of our food pantry, and for the partnership we’ve developed over the years in working with Siffrin homes. If you donate the cash, we’ll shop for the turkeys! We need your gifts by Sunday, November 16th.

OUTSTANDING NEWS FROM OUR 2014 YOUTH MISSIONS CRAFT SHOW

Thank you, Connie Frank, Debbie Fox, Dale Jacobs, and everyone who joined in this fabulous effort! We built on last year's success, and we had no difficulty attracting the crafters we needed, who rented sixty-three tables, making this year's edition of the Youth Missions Craft Show another great event for Zion and Zion's Youth! Connie Frank again assumed her leadership role for the Craft Show side of this Oktoberfest extravaganza. What a professional touch she invariably adds to this unbelievable event. Between craft tables rented, German dinners sold, the bake sale table, the concessions stand, and our themed basket raffle, total income once again exceeded the \$6,000.00 plateau!

In terms of dollars and cents, when the final totals were tallied, our income from renting craft tables was \$2,205.00. The Bake Sale contributed \$220.00 to our totals. Between our pre-sold tickets for our German dinners and the Concession Stand on the day of the Craft Show, add another \$2,902.00 to that total. Last, but not least, our Themed Raffle Baskets produced \$755.25 in ticket sales. All of this adds up to **\$6,082.25!** While there are a number of expenses that need to be covered in paying for an event like the Craft Show, the revenues produced are mind-numbing. It is hard not to stand in awe at what this Oktoberfest extravaganza has become, both in terms of dollars that are made and the volunteers who step forward.

Just take a moment to consider this list of names of folks involved: Connie Frank had great support from her husband Jeff, and daughters, Carley and Cassie, plus lots of other husbands and wives, children and friends, like the Fox family, the Rhodes family, the Thompsons, the Dagues, Chrissy Nicholson, the Riffles, Janet Sleese, and so many more who helped out during the course of the day itself. There's Jayne Schrader, Kay Reiss, Renee Keith, and Chuck Danner. A good part of our revenues come from the German dinners. The kitchen is a crazy and active place. We thank the Singing Chef, Dale Jacobs, and his faithful crew of Cathy Harvey, Darlene Milavickas, Marilyn Espe-Sherwindt, and Ron Tvorik. The list goes on and on and on. All we can do is to extend our thanks to everyone who helped make this event such a great day!

This year we would like to add one more special name for helping add to the success of our Youth Missions Craft Show. Dave Zastawny, our Thrivent representative, not only rented a craft table. He again donated the makings of our Pink Ribbon Raffle Basket, and took time from a vacation trip south to help us apply for some matching funds from the Stark County chapter of Thrivent Financial for Lutherans, who expect to add another \$500.00 to the total of funds raised for youth missions, which, of course, includes local outreach, mission trips, and all sorts of activities that are intended to raise awareness of the connection between God's love for us and our service to others. LUTHER'S SMALL CATECHISM

Jeff Hisson has been leading our Adult Sunday School Class in a refresher course that covers the basics of our Lutheran faith by reviewing Luther's *Small Catechism*. The *Small Catechism* has been the backbone of teaching young Lutherans the Christian faith ever since Martin Luther wrote it in 1529. Ruth Elsass has often shared some older catechetical materials and certificates that go way back in Zion's history as a congregational family; but not even Ruth's collectibles get us back to 1529! But Jeff Hisson has, not with historical artifacts, but with his mastery of history during, before, and after the period of the Reformation in the 16th century.

Our Adult Sunday School Class, which meets between the services in Luther Hall, has really enjoyed what Jeff has brought to the table, which is actually six tables so that everyone can have a seat! We started back in September, and have covered the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, Baptism, Holy Communion, and the Office of the Keys – not the keys to the office, which are many, but the key to Christian living, which focuses on turning God's grace into shared forgiveness.

All Saints Sunday brought into focus three keys to our confidence in God's gift of salvation: *sola gratia, sola Scriptura, sola fides*. With that said, Jeff is beginning to wrap up this journey through the basics of our faith by turning, first, to the Book of Concord, and then to holy pilgrimages of Saints James, Andrew, Peter, and Martin. This will lead to one of his great and lasting joys as someone who has taught Spanish all of his professional life, namely, introducing us to the Feast of Our Lady Guadalupe! The date for this will be December 7th. Plan to learn more by joining us on Sunday mornings.



IN LOVING MEMORY OF LARRY MOORE

August 9, 1918 – October 23, 2014

Ninety-six years, two months, and fourteen days of a full and blessed life, filled full with a sense of faithful service, a heart of gold, and rugged hands that were well-practiced in the art of reaching out, doing one's share, pulling one's weight, and then a whole lot more. Larry's work with Zion's Food Pantry is legendary; but that is only the tip of the iceberg, a small glimpse of how visible Larry was everywhere at Zion. All I know is that if we planned it, Larry supported it, and not just with his presence, but with heartfelt, hands-on care and commitment. Larry had a face and a smile that was predictably warm and friendly; and his support was something that you knew you could trust, rely upon, and count on.

I could go on and on about the good Larry did, about the good man he was, the quiet and stalwart way in which he went about his calling of being a "good and faithful servant" of our good and loving Lord. But I think that it is important to remember that Larry didn't do these things to earn God's favor, or ours. What stands out in this life that in many ways just kind of blended in, is what Larry taught us about those who are genuinely surprised that they had done anything special by caring about the hungry, the needy, the naked, persons down on their luck, down on themselves, or just down and depressed. Larry wasn't looking to win awards, impress his neighbors, or the big boss upstairs. When you're called, you say *Yes*. When help is needed, you help. You do your part, because you can, with a smile, good will and good cheer. That was Larry's way.

I know that we'll all miss Larry. It's good to know that he lived a long and full life. It's comforting to think about how gracious God was in calling him home without an extended period of decline, or a painful lingering that so many endure nowadays. Right to the end Larry was clear-minded, and resolute in doing his part, while hoping for the best. But I think of Larry during World War II in the foxhole he shared with two others, with the protective logs overhead blown to bits by incoming mortar, taken to a field hospital where the diagnosis confirmed that things were worse than he had let on, and then returning to the front lines, where he discovered that all but two of his buddies were gone. Burdens like these can crush the human spirit through the sheer weight of incredible trauma.

But Larry's spirit wasn't crushed. Larry returned from his years at war, years without much training, where he was rushed through Scotland to the front lines in France, given less than a moment to celebrate the war ending in Europe, before being told to get ready for Japan. Larry returned to Evelyn Louise Himes, and on May 23rd, 1948, he was drafted into the role of husband, father, provider, and then grandfather and great-grandfather, joining in the multi-generational Himes connection to Zion and making it his own, without ever looking back, always looking forward to the next opportunity to enjoy the blessings of being a blessing.

"Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you some food, or thirsty and gave you a drink, or naked and gave you clothing? And our Lord will answer, "Inasmuch as you did to the least, the lost, and the lowly, you did it to me." Larry, the children of a besieged Europe, and their children, thank you. The many persons who have walked through our doors at Zion to be served through the ministry of our food pantry thank you.
