



## February 2017 President's Message

**Where the Rubber Meets the Road**

Ladies and Gentlemen, members and friends, I want to take you on a Road Trip! We have spent the last six months getting ready for this trip. We have learned to drive on our own. We have reorganized Council, we have staffed the Secretary position, we have upgraded technology, we have gotten the Parsonage updated and rented. We have figured out that it takes a lot to run an organization that employs several folks, maintains a building, supports a community and reaches out to the world. All of these are tasks for the members. The car is gassed up, there is windshield juice in the reservoir and we have packed up the kids and snacks. Now it is time to put this car in motion. ***This is where the rubber meets the road.***

This will be a trip of hard spiritual work. Now is the time for us to figure out where Zion is and where it is trying to go. No one else can do this for us. We have had a living community for 200 years, during that time things change. New Berlin becomes North Canton. Hoover Company comes and goes. We see the congregation swell and decline. We need to take the wheel, take control of our destiny and make decisions about what we want to become. Ultimately we need to hear that small voice in the quiet that helps us discern what God is Calling Zion to be.



Well there is no pressure there!!! How are we going to figure out what God wants for us?! That is what the Interim Period is all about. Pastor Hal is here to shepherd the flock while we get busy figuring out the next steps. We are now ready to look at those next steps. We kicked the process off with a Guest Sermon from Rev. Al Votaw. He told the story of "Singing the Lord's Song in a Strange Land". Next we are sponsoring a **Leadership Retreat on 25 Feb.** This is a Saturday all day, time to meet, talk together, do some learning activities etc. The focus will be on engineering our next steps. The retreat will be held at Arrowhead Golf & Banquet Hall. There will be lunch and snacks. Council and the Call committee will be there. It is open to ALL interested members of the congregation. Please come and help the Call Committee understand your needs, your version of God's song. The other part is Home Gatherings. These can be held anywhere. We want to get down to smaller group discussions so we can be sure that everyone can be heard. The thoughts and concerns of the congregation are synthesized for the Call Committee. They will use that to build the Congregational Profile. The Profile then is what prospective pastors look at and decide if we are where they want to be.

**Get Us a New Pastor Fund**

When Bishop Allende visited with Council last May, he suggested that we have a fund of about \$5000 to \$6000 to cover the costs of the call process. That fund will cover the Leadership Retreat. It will cover travel expenses for pastors coming to see Zion and interview. It would cover expenses if some of the call committee decided to go and be a part of a service in the pastor's current call. Any money left in the fund after that could be used to cover moving expenses for the newly Called Pastor and his family. We have plenty of money in our investment funds to cover any expenses that we might need to make however Council believes that we should not use that unnecessarily. Council approved starting a fund to prepare for a New Pastor. You will be seeing special envelopes soon. Please help us get ready for a new spiritual leader. In Return – No Early Bird arm twisting this year. Promise!

## PURPOSE OF THE RESOURCE MINISTRY

As the Resource Ministry Elder, I have been asked to provide some commentary as to the role this Ministry plays in the life of Zion Lutheran Church. To understand this Ministry's purpose, it is important to know that its official name is the Resource Development Ministry Team. As the titular leader of this Ministry, it is my responsibility to gather and marshal the efforts of a team of Congregation members who are talented and experienced in financial, commercial and accounting matters to support the Congregation's mission to grow financial and human resources and manage the day-to-day financial affairs of the Congregation.

Simply put, the Resource Ministry keeps track of our financial situation, allocates the resources to meet the needs of different ministries and invests our financial revenues in a manner that helps our resources grow.

This is a task simply stated, but not easily accomplished. To perform this task, we need dedicated people to draft a budget guideline for the succeeding year which takes into account not only our obligations to fund Zion's various Ministries but also our fair share in support of the wider Ministry of the ELCA and the Northeast Ohio Synod. The Resource Ministry is responsible for ensuring the efficient conduct of the Congregation's financial affairs, giving particular attention to prompt payment of all obligations and forwarding benevolence monies to the Synodical Treasurer. The Resource Team is responsible for providing adequate Church property and liability insurance; promoting Christian stewardship; recording skills and interests of Church Members and matching them up to the Congregation's needs; and, subject to Congregation Council supervision, the Congregation's investments.

We in the Congregation are blessed to have individuals willing to take on this task so critical to the life of our Congregation.

## RESOURCE MINISTRY

As is the norm, our giving was quite generous in December, 2016 and enabled us to shrink the deficit impressively. Although we finished the year 2016

with a slight deficit, we are quite optimistic about Zion's future and our ability to meet our goals and fulfill our mission. Our positive attitude stems from the fact that the generosity of the Congregation enabled us to significantly offset the negative financial impact of:

1. Increased structure and landscaping expenses caused by inclement weather;
2. Increased expenses associated with the hiring of a fulltime Secretary;
3. The decrease in revenue precipitated by the loss of our day care tenant; and
4. Revenue lost by virtue of the Parsonage being without a tenant for several months during the year.

In spite of all of the adversity and notwithstanding the uncertainty always inherent in the retirement of a Pastor who has served a Congregation for 14 years, the Congregation demonstrated its commitment to Zion's future through the support given to our Interim Pastor, enthusiastic participation in events and healthy financial support of our benevolent enterprises. We are very thankful for the opportunities to fulfill our Mission "To Grow in Love and Service by Grace" made possible by the generous support of the Congregation.

### WOMEN OF ZION

Many times the Comfort Givers are asked, Where are the comforts you make for missions sent? The Lutheran World Relief (LWR) has two shipping points. One in Minnesota, the other in Maryland which serves 16 countries. Our little shipping point is from Seville, Ohio to Windsor, Maryland. Next, they are packed in large bails and shipped to countries with LWR Partner Agencies such as Angola, Georgia, Honduras, India, Mali, Nicaragua, Serbia, Tanzania, and the Ukraine.

We recently received statistics for 2015-2016 that LWR received 346,170 comforts/quilts and 12,180 blankets.

These gifts of love will bring a message of hope and caring to be used as warm bedding, a simple tent, dividers for multi-families, a wrap or to carry their possessions.

We are so blessed and grateful that we could be partners in some small way by sending 45 comforts and 32 blankets. Thank You and God's blessings to all who helped.

8. Lip balm/Chapstick




Registrations are needed in order that we can provide adequate seating, food, and materials for each one in attendance.

# Monday Musings

[Jesus said:] "You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled underfoot.

[Matthew 5:13 NRSV]



We are in the season of Epiphany, which is traditionally known as the season of light. In our reading from the Gospel according to Matthew for this coming Sunday, the Fifth Sunday after Epiphany, Jesus presents a different image when he calls his disciples, "the salt of the earth."

I used the following illustration in a sermon I preached several years ago, when this reading last came up in the lectionary: Greek aristocrats had a custom of buying their slaves with salt. If the slave did not meet the purchaser's expectation, that slave "was not worth his salt." From which we get the expression, "He is not worth his salt."

The next time you're at a social gathering and want to impress others with your vast knowledge of useless trivia, dazzle them with this little nugget: Salt was a vital element in the Roman imperial economy. Roman soldiers were paid in salt rations—hence the word "salary."

You are the salt of the earth. You are a valuable commodity. You are of precious worth in the eyes of God. But in his book, *THE COURAGE TO LOVE*, Dr. William Sloane Coffin, shares, "God's love does not seek value; it creates it. It's not because we have value that God loves us - it is because God loves us that we have real value at all."

Out of that relationship of love and grace, and because you and I are the salt of the earth, Jesus calls us to BE salt - to do good works, salting the earth. Salt has a powerful influence. Salt is a great preservative for things like ham. Road crews use salt to melt snow off the highways and provide for safe travels for motorists. Salt seasons, salt heals, salt preserves. The world needs us, in particular, the most vulnerable: the poor, the starving, the homeless, the prisoner, the immigrant, the refugee, and those suffering wars. It needs to see that we are-in fact-all related and that our relationship is one of peace, of God's righteousness and God's love.

I look forward to visiting with the good, salty people of Martin Luther Lutheran Church in Youngstown this coming Sunday, February 5.

May God bless you and preserve you in the coming week.
